#### URBAN AGRICULTURE PRESENTATION

A presentation was made by staff member Neil Korotash, Morinville Community High School on the success of the Urban Agriculture program at the school. Introduced three years ago, an overview on the course was provided highlighting some of the key areas of study including: butchering, dairy farming, canning, foraging, the outdoor and indoor gardens, along with many field trips that extend the learning. Mr. Korotash recognized the support of the numerous community partnerships that have supported and contributed to the success of the program. It is now one of the top four option classes that students choose, continues to grow in popularity and teaches students, a variety of life skills including the promotion of healthy eating, and the development of entrepeunerial skills. Trustees commended Mr. Korotash on his initiative in bringing this learning opportunity to students and furthering community support.

### **ASBA Expenses**

-ASBA is posting expenses online for members of the ASBA Board of Directors and the Executive Director effective January 1, 2016.

### Review of the Municipal Government Act (MGA)

- Municipal Affairs Minister Larivee, has announced the next steps in their public Consultation process.
- ASBA has presented these issues to Minister Larivee and Minister Eggen. MGA will be tabled in late May, 2016, and it is anticipated that from this point, events will unfold very quickly
- -Materials circulated at the ASBA Provincial Issues Forum may be accessed on the ASBA Website.

### Significant concerns:

- Erosion of local autonomy for school boards
- -Disregard for agreements currently in place in Alberta that are working well
- Negative impacts on educational outcomes through the disruption of current reserve processes and structures (site size, use and design)
- -Legislative requirements which may conflict with other provincial legislation (School closures)
- -Loss of control of local elector base through the potential repeal of Education Property Tax
- -Substantive increase in costs for sites with the creation of off-site levies
- Amendments to the legislation must protect local autonomy
- -School boards ought to be directly consulted in review of the legislation and as a discrete stakeholder group both in advance and subsequent to tabling any amendments.
- The new MGA will be proclaimed in 2017 prior to the next municipal elections.

Chamber Luncheon Relevancy to GSACRD: networking with St. Albert mayor and councillors, St Albert Public trustees, Mayors and councillors of surrounding towns and regions, St. Albert business owners, table discussion, introduced as an elected official of GSACRD, and guest speaker enrichment.

**An item of interest** - Chamber President, Linda Moffat announced her retirement April 6 to become effective December 2016. Michael Cooper in his address, stated that Linda Moffat was not only a pillar of the Chamber, she was also a pillar of the community. The Selection Committee is asking anyone interested to come forward by contacting the past board chair Barry Bailey.

# Speaker: Michael Cooper – Member of Parliament "The Shape of the New Government" @Cooper4SAE

- Michael was formerly a student in the GSACRD District, was and presently is an elector and Eucharistic Minister of the St Albert Parish. He attended the University of Alberta and received his Bachelor of Law Degree with Distinction. Prior to being elected in 2015, he worked as a civil litigator.
- Michael has recently served a Co-Vice Chair of a Committee on Physician Assisted Dying.
   A key recommendation of the Committee was appropriate funding for Palliative Care.
   He feels the Federal Budget of 2016 has reneged on the promise, leaving behind vulnerable Canadians.
- The federal budget has no new funds of roads, railroads, or other transportation systems. The ill-defined \$11.9 billion of infrastructure dollars over 5 years will go toward green and social programs. There is a 76% discretionary increase in program spending.
- Taxes will increase for all Canadians especially small businesses, although 98% of all commerce are small businesses employing more than 70 percent of the private sector.
- Member of Parliament Cooper disagreed with the 3.7 billion dollars deferred on military hardware and equipment when there is such a serious threat from terrorism.
- Cooper did commend the government's effort to fund public transportation and Michael said he would fight for St Albert's fair share to help build the LRT to Edmonton.

### **Board Policy Review**

### PRESENTERS:

David Keohane, superintendent of schools

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Board in cooperation with the Superintendent shall review board policies each year in order to determine whether or not the policy is meeting its intended purpose.

Board Policy 16 – Alternative Programs was last reviewed May 2015 with no recommended changes.

No changes are recommended at this time.

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

THAT the Board of Trustees approve the review of Board Policy 16 – Alternative Programs with no changes.

### **ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS**

The Board believes that parents have a right and a responsibility to make decisions about the education of their children. In order to exercise that right, parents need to have choices in the kind of education their children will receive.

Alternative programs, pursuant to Section 21 of the School Act, that emphasize a particular language, culture, religion or subject-matter, or that use a particular teaching philosophy may be made available where numbers warrant and when financially feasible.

An alternative program is not a Section 47 special education program, a Section 10 Francophone education program, or a program of religious education that is approved by the Bishops of Alberta and mandated by the Board for implementation within district schools.

The Board is committed to the belief that all students have right of access to quality education programs. Therefore, the Board is responsible for student outcomes, for assessing student achievement, and for monitoring results in all programs.

#### **Guidelines**

- 1. Parents or an organization of parents may request that the Board provide an alternative program.
- 2. The Board may provide an alternative program where numbers warrant subject to availability of classroom space, and rules established by the Board.
- 3. Where an alternative program is offered within a school, the Board shall maintain the integrity and viability of the regular education program.
- 4. The Board may restrict enrolment in the alternative program if there is insufficient space in a school, or to maintain the viability or integrity of programs within that school.
- 5. The Board may designate an alternative program to operate in a separate building or within a school building offering a regular program.
- 6. Alternative programs shall be under the direction of the principal of a school offering the regular program. However, he/she may assign a school administrative position with primary responsibility for the alternative program.

- 7. The Board may designate an alternative program to be an operating school. As such, parents of students attending the alternative program may form a school council pursuant to Section 22 of the School Act.
- 8. Where a school council has been formed for an alternative school program the Board may delegate by resolution, specific duties and functions to the school council. These same specific duties and functions may be delegated to other parental advisory bodies by Board motion.
- 9. All staff employed or assigned to teach or work in the alternative program shall be employees of the Board, and:
  - 9.1 Enjoy the same privileges and benefits extended to all other employees through Board policies and existing collective agreements; and
  - 9.2 Shall be subject to all Board policies, administrative requirements and requirements of the School Act.

However, the Board shall seek the recommendation of the school council, or other parental advisory body, regarding the employment and assignment of staff to an alternative program.

- 10. A school providing an alternative program shall provide courses of study and education programs prescribed by the Minister or approved by the Board and may not use any course, education program or instructional materials prohibited by the Minister or the Board. The school council or other parental advisory body, in consultation with the Principal, shall be responsible for selecting curriculum resources to be used in the program.
- 11. A school offering an alternative program shall be operated in accordance with the requirements of the School Act, Alberta Education policy and regulations, and the policies of the Board.
- 12. Parents of students wishing to enroll in an alternative program must become familiar with the program philosophy and rules established by the Board and the school council or other parental advisory body (as approved by the Board).
- 13. Budget allocations for an alternative school program will normally be outlined in the Principles for the Basis of Allocations.
- 14. The Board may provide a one-time start up allocation for a new alternate programs.
- 15. The Board may charge parents a fee for the purpose of defraying all or a portion of:
  - 15.1 Any non-instructional costs that may be incurred by the Board in offering the alternative program; and
  - 15.2 Any instructional material costs that are in addition to the costs incurred by the Board in providing its regular program.

- 16. The Board, school council or other advisory body (as approved by the Board) delegated decision making authority with respect to an alternative program, shall provide six months notice that it no longer plans to offer or support the alternative program. Notice of less than six months may be accepted by mutual agreement.
- 17. A school council or other advisory body (as approved by the Board) delegated decision making authority with respect to an alternative program may request a hearing before the Board to address concerns that cannot be resolved with the administration.
- 18. The Board may enter into a written agreement with a school council or other advisory body (as approved by the Board) regarding the provision of alternative programs.
- 19. An organization of parents wishing to implement an alternative program shall apply to the Board in writing no later than February 1st in the school year prior to the program commencement. The application shall provide:
  - 19.1 Details about the proposed program;
  - 19.2 Projected enrolments;
  - 19.3 Information regarding services and resources being requested; and
  - 19.4 Proposed arrangements for student accommodation and transportation.
- 20. A decision by the Board to approve or not approve the implementation of the program will be based upon the following criteria:
  - 20.1 That the program will improve student engagement in meeting all learning goals within the provincial Guide to Education, and those which have been locally established by the Board;
  - 20.2 That the program, through board allocations and / or student fees can be resourced to the same quality as any program offered throughout the district;
  - 20.3 That board allocations will not detract from the ability of all students in the district to access resources that will assure their attainment of learning goals;
  - 20.4 That the program enables staff to be resourced in a working environment that corresponds to their particular skills, interest, and expertise;
  - 20.5 That the program maintains or enhances the quality of Catholic education within the district:
  - 20.6 That the program may be assigned to a school that has space and resources to promote the program, where the program is also a cultural fit for the school community.
- 21. The role of the principal who administers an alternative program is key to determining that the rationale for program approval, as previously outlined may be sustained on an annual basis. Therefore, as per Section 20 of the School Act, the principal may be requested to evaluate any approved Alternative Program and make recommendations to assure that the basis for program approval can be sustained on an annual basis.

- 22. The Board may enter into a written agreement with a school council or parent organization requesting an alternative program, and the agreement shall:
  - 22.1 Outline specific details regarding the provision of the program: and
  - 22.2 Specify the areas of decision-making authority the Board delegates, by Board resolution, to the school council.

### **2016–2017 Strategic Plan**

### PRESENTER:

### BACKGROUND:

On April 25, 2016, the Board approved the Strategic Priority Report (*attached*) arising from its recent planning session that was conducted earlier on April 15 & 16. The attached plan is a concise and high-level summary of the priorities arising from the Strategic Priority Report.

The Board is best advised to maintain a few and broadly stated priorities to ensure that sufficient capacity in the District exists to achieve goals, and to enable employees to exercise diverse talents and skills so that planned outcomes can be effectively achieved with unique applications at the local level.

Board approval of this plan reflects more specific plans for implementation as they will be reflected within the 2016 - 2019 Three Year Education Plan, the 2016 - 2017 Board Advocacy Plan, and the 2016 - 2017 District Communications Plan.

### RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Board of Trustees approve the 2016 – 2017 Strategic Plan as presented.

### 2016-2017 Strategic Priority Report to the Board

### Background

The Board initiated work for the District in a strategic planning process for 2016 - 2017 through its annual planning session on April 15 – 16. Work conducted at this time was responsive to direction provided in Board Policy 2: Role of the Board. Under the area of "planning," the policy indicates that the Board shall:

Annually set strategic priorities and key results.

The Board's strategic work arose from an assessment of the District's advocacy and educational priorities and assessed where the District is positioned in terms of these priorities. The areas for consideration were:

- the status of system readiness for more comprehensive application of Government programming dedicated to FNMI, beginning with an understanding of Truth and Reconciliation;
- addressing a new faith goal for the upcoming school year;
- assuring safe, caring, respectful, and inclusive learning communities within our schools:
- making sense of community feedback regarding bullying, student mental health, and well-being within our schools;
- understanding district enrollment and programming market-share in our communities;
- validating priorities within the 2016 2017 District Communications Plan.

### **Emerging Priorities**

The Board deems that the following outcomes are necessary in enabling the District to pursue effective strategic processes dedicated to the success of our students:

#### Re: FNMI Education –

Education is most meaningfully pursued through a culture of "right relationships," which includes empathy, understanding, and support for others based upon their personal needs and cultural circumstances. Therefore, the following results need to be pursued in bringing a government curriculum for FNMI education into our schools:

- dedicate an awareness and understanding of our shared history, and shared responsibility in order to share building a better future for our students;
- maintain an FNMI perspective and world view in understanding how to build a better future:
- incorporate elders and community leaders dedicated to the needs of FNMI people into our programming;
- develop a learning day to celebrate FNMI learning.



### Re: New Faith Goal for 2016 – 2017 –

Establish a theme dedicated to Pope Francis' "Year of Mercy" for the Catholic Church. In developing this theme:

- pursue a theme that can be "animated;"
- establish a concrete and actionable theme;
- focus on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy;
- address prayers dedicated to mercy through a spontaneous prayer (prayers from the heart);
- enable the theme to have visual impact at the school and district levels.

### Re: Safe, Caring, Respectful, and Inclusive Communities –

• respond to ministerial expectations within legislation while honouring Church teachings especially our unconditional respect for the dignity of the human person.

### Re: Community Feedback to Bullying and Student Mental Health / Well - Being -

- enact the "Taking Action" Report as developed by CCLC, in response to pre-dominant themes from community feedback;
- focus on resourcing, community engagement, and advocacy as three elements that will most meaningfully address student mental health needs in our schools. This involves three distinct areas in supporting these elements:
  - o Resourcing
    - establish equity in assuring in-school counselling services for students;
    - promote stable and predictable internal and external supports for students;
    - further the presence of bereavement and loss teams.
  - o Community Engagement
    - promote awareness to "mental health" needs in the community;
    - provide an awareness and presence of healthy relationship programs within our schools;
    - further the instruction of social competencies within our existing programs;
  - Advocacy
    - share with others the value of restorative practices as a component in furthering just and compassionate communities;
    - promote a universal design for learning paradigm in addressing mental health and well-being;
    - further communication of needs between the District and external community services.

### Re: District Enrollment Trends –

- promote in liaising with local governments and the provincial government the importance of the timely availability of schools sites to assure service viability and accessibility in new municipal Area Structure Plans;
- celebrate the strong attraction of families to our educational mandate, who by their choice, enable our district to exceed provincial trends regarding enrollments in Catholic education;
- sustain the continuity of enrollment of students within K 12 Catholic education.

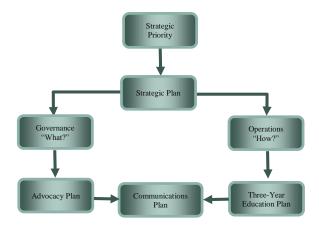


### Re: District Communications –

- 4. At the Regular Meeting on June 27<sup>th</sup>, the Board will approve the District Framework for Developing the Three-Year Education Plan and School Education Plans.
- 5. At a Regular Meeting in September 2016, the Board will approve its Advocacy Plan and monitoring calendar for the 2016 2019 Three-Year Education Plan / Governance Planning Priorities.
- 6. At a Regular Meeting in September 2016, the Board will approve the District Communications Plan.
