QUESTIONS FROM THE PUBLIC

Melissa Phillips, Parent, Neil M. Ross School

Ms. Phillips submitted the following questions to the Board:

- 1. Why is transportation access denied to the GSACRD children in Crossing at River's Edge when there is current busing provided to children from Sturgeon School Division by large buses?
- 2. How do we obtain a copy of the written report detailing the reasons for the refusal of bus service to the Crossing and how do we appeal it?

In addition to the two questions submitted, Ms. Phillips provided some context to Board for background and understanding as to why those questions were being posed to the Board. A request was made by Trustees to Ms. Phillips to have the additional detail she referred to submitted to the secretary-treasurer. Trustee Radford indicated that according to established policy, a written response would be provided within two (2) weeks and referenced at the first meeting following the response.

Alyssa Frew, Parent, Neil M. Ross

Ms. Frew indicated that she was asking her questions on behalf of 25 families, who have 59 children collectively attending Neil M. Ross School.

Ms. Frew submitted the following questions to the Board:

- 1. Why are the 48 Neil M Ross Catholic School elementary students residing in the Guilbault District designated to Vital Grandin School which has bus times of over 60 minutes for less than 19 elementary students?
- 2. What are the reasons for designating Guilbault region to VG School and does the decision that was made so long ago still meet the needs of the bulk of GSARCD Guilbault elementary students? How do we meet the school transportation needs for the families of the students in this region?

It was noted the interest is one of choice and there is no intent to erode the education provided at Vital Grandin.

In addition to the two questions submitted, Ms. Frew provided some context to Board for background and understanding as to why those questions were being posed to the Board. A request was made by Trustees to Ms. Frew to have the additional detail she referred to submitted to the secretary-treasurer.

Trustee Shaw inquired as to why educational needs cannot be met at Vital Grandin? Extra-curricular activity options (i.e. running club) and higher staff numbers were two areas mentioned.

Trustee Radford indicated that according to established policy, a written response would be provided within two (2) weeks and referenced at the first meeting following the response.

ASBA Expenses

-ASBA is posting expenses online for members of the ASBA Board of Directors and the Executive Director effective January 1, 2016.

Review of the Municipal Government Act (MGA)

- Municipal Affairs Minister Larivee, has announced the next steps in their public Consultation process.
- ASBA has presented these issues to Minister Larivee and Minister Eggen. MGA will be tabled in late May, 2016, and it is anticipated that from this point, events will unfold very quickly
- -Materials circulated at the ASBA Provincial Issues Forum may be accessed on the ASBA Website.

Significant concerns:

- Erosion of local autonomy for school boards
- -Disregard for agreements currently in place in Alberta that are working well
- Negative impacts on educational outcomes through the disruption of current reserve processes and structures (site size, use and design)
- -Legislative requirements which may conflict with other provincial legislation (School closures)
- -Loss of control of local elector base through the potential repeal of Education Property Tax
- -Substantive increase in costs for sites with the creation of off-site levies
- Amendments to the legislation must protect local autonomy
- -School boards ought to be directly consulted in review of the legislation and as a discrete stakeholder group both in advance and subsequent to tabling any amendments.
- The new MGA will be proclaimed in 2017 prior to the next municipal elections.

Implementation of Bill 10

- ASBA Directors are working in collaboration with the ATA, CASS, ASCA, the Society for Safe and Caring Schools, Alberta Education, AISCA and others in supporting the implementation of Bill 10.

Motion 504

-Ric McIver, the Progressive Conservative Party interim Leader introduced Motion 504 in the legislature which reads as follows: "Be it resolved that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government to affirm its commitment to allowing parents the choice of educational delivery for their children, including home, charter, private, francophone, separate, or public education programs".

Chamber Luncheon Relevancy to GSACRD: networking with St. Albert mayor and councillors, St Albert Public trustees, Mayors and councillors of surrounding towns and regions, St. Albert business owners, table discussion, introduced as an elected official of GSACRD, and guest speaker enrichment.

An item of interest - Chamber President, Linda Moffat announced her retirement April 6 to become effective December 2016. Michael Cooper in his address, stated that Linda Moffat was not only a pillar of the Chamber, she was also a pillar of the community. The Selection Committee is asking anyone interested to come forward by contacting the past board chair Barry Bailey.

Speaker: Michael Cooper – Member of Parliament "The Shape of the New Government" @Cooper4SAE

- Michael was formerly a student in the GSACRD District, was and presently is an elector and Eucharistic Minister of the St Albert Parish. He attended the University of Alberta and received his Bachelor of Law Degree with Distinction. Prior to being elected in 2015, he worked as a civil litigator.
- Michael has recently served a Co-Vice Chair of a Committee on Physician Assisted Dying.
 A key recommendation of the Committee was appropriate funding for Palliative Care.
 He feels the Federal Budget of 2016 has reneged on the promise, leaving behind vulnerable Canadians.
- The federal budget has no new funds of roads, railroads, or other transportation systems. The ill-defined \$11.9 billion of infrastructure dollars over 5 years will go toward green and social programs. There is a 76% discretionary increase in program spending.
- Taxes will increase for all Canadians especially small businesses, although 98% of all commerce are small businesses employing more than 70 percent of the private sector.
- Member of Parliament Cooper disagreed with the 3.7 billion dollars deferred on military hardware and equipment when there is such a serious threat from terrorism.
- Cooper did commend the government's effort to fund public transportation and Michael said he would fight for St Albert's fair share to help build the LRT to Edmonton.
