

Nov. 27, 2020 Superintendent's Update: Students, Parents/Legal Guardians, and Staff

We look forward to celebrating another <u>Advent season</u>, which begins this Sunday (Nov. 29) and runs until Dec. 24. As the start of the Church's liturgical calendar, this is a time to ponder the great mystery of the incarnation, when God took on our humanity in the Person of Jesus Christ, entering time and space to free us from sin and to conquer death. As Father William Saunders said, "During Advent, we strive to fulfill the opening prayer for Mass of the First Sunday of Advent: 'Father in Heaven, ...increase our longing for Christ, our Saviour, and give us the strength to grow in love that the dawn of His coming may find us rejoicing in His presence and welcoming the Light of His Truth.'"¹ There is more information about Advent, and a blessing for a wreath, on our website.

As noted in the <u>special update</u> that I shared on Nov. 25, Premier Jason Kenney <u>declared</u> a **state of public health emergency** in Alberta on Nov. 24. The Alberta Government has established stronger <u>mandatory</u>, <u>province-wide</u> <u>public health measures</u> to help slow down the spread of the COVID-19. We continue to work closely with both medical and government authorities, as well as surrounding school jurisdictions, to enact measures that comply with public health guidelines and help mitigate the risks of further transmission.

As a reminder, students will transition to at-home learning on Nov. 30 (grades 7 to 12) and Jan. 4 (Pre-K to grade 6). Unless directed otherwise by the province, in-person classes for all students will resume on Jan. 11. Junior and senior high school principals have sent communication to parents/legal guardians, outlining what this process will look like in their child(ren)'s respective schools. Elementary school principals will send similar information to families before online learning for Pre-K to grade 6 students commences. If you have specific questions, please reach out to your child(ren)'s school directly.

All <u>public health measures</u> are described on the Alberta Government's <u>website</u>. The <u>province has said</u> that, if followed, these measures will help to protect our health care system, keep schools and businesses open as much as possible, and protect vulnerable Albertans. Let us all take this issue seriously, each doing our part to respect and follow all health measures so that we can bend the curve and so students and staff can return to the classrooms as soon as possible.

We have updated our <u>Parent Guidebook for School Re-Entry: 2020-2021</u> and our <u>website</u>, and following us on social media (<u>Facebook</u>, <u>Twitter</u>, and <u>Instagram</u>) is a great way to stay up-to-date. Your child(ren)'s school principal can best address your concerns as they apply to <u>your child(ren's) school</u>.
